


But we have also seen much that has truly made these the best of times.


 We witnessed community agencies in Peel come together like never before to address anti-Black racism and embedded discrimination, striving to create genuine, systemic change.







Collaborations We Lead



The HEAL Network is a partnership of 20 human service organizations dedicated to supporting mothers and their children exposed to violence. Services include individual, family, and group counselling.



The **60 West Collaborative Leadership Table** is composed of the senior leaders of the organizations that call the Honourable William G. Davis Centre for Families their home. We come together to advance our vision to create a welcoming space for people and partnerships that supports and fosters resilience in families, individuals, and communities.



The **Safe Centre of Peel** provides a safe and welcoming space where a range of agencies come together to offer integrated services addressing the needs of those experiencing family and intimate partner violence. The Centre's capacity to provide wrap-around services is enhanced by strong working relationships with its onsite and off-site community partners.



The **Safer Families Program** is a collaboration between Peel CAS and CFSPD to provide counselling and support to families when children have witnessed intimate partner violence.

nCourage is an integrated services hub for victims and survivors of human sext trafficking co-lead by CFSPD and Our Place Peel with Elizabeth Fry Society Peel-Halton. It is supported by a collaboration of organizations, the Peel Human Trafficking Services Providers Committee, which is represented by over 40 organizations committed to work together to provide a broad range of services.

Collaborations We Are A Part Of



Established in 2003, **Peel Elder Abuse Prevention Network** consists of service providers, community advocates, and seniors, to educate, raise awareness, and develop a collaborative approach to support seniors who experience abuse. PEAPN is currently lead by Family Services of Peel supported by 50 community partners.



PCAWA is a community coordinating committee with a mandate to promote a comprehensive and effective response to woman abuse. The cross-sector agency membership includes Women's shelters, Victim services, Family service agencies, settlement partners, Peel Regional Police, Peel CAS, and others.



Peel's Community Safety and Well-being Plan presents an opportunity to work together across sectors advancing a collective vision for a Peel that is a safe, inclusive and connected community where all residents thrive. Our Mission, to work together to ensure access to services and supports that advance safety, connectedness and well-being for all Peel residents in the areas of family violence, mental health and addictions, and systemic discrimination.



The **Malton Youth Wellness Hub** was established by Youth Wellness Hubs Ontario (YWHO). This initiative brings services to youth and their families at a central location in their community. Services include mental health and addiction services, as well as housing, education, recreation, and employment and training supports.

CAS/VAW Committee


Partner agencies come together to increase collaboration and communication between the VAW and CAS sectors, through the CAS/VAW Collaboration Agreement.
